It started when the doors were opened on the corner of Co. Road C & Victoria Street North. "Come & See!" was all it took and people have been coming to see what God has been up to ever since.

But "Come & See!" isn't just an invitation that has come and gone. It's the invitation that continues to draw us in to God's ever-widening

story. And though Prince of Peace has been part of this story for over 60 years now, God is still surprising us with new ways of being the church and loving the world.

As we launch into a new program year, "Come & See" will be the theme that helps us look back to celebrate all the creative ways that we've been the church while at the same time keep us looking forward and discovering all the places where God is calling us next.

Message from Pastor Lynn Erickson

Dear Friends, I've turned into my mother.

More than twenty years ago, my mom began tagging monarchs through Monarch Watch, a nonprofit program run by the University of Kansas that focuses on the monarch butterfly and its spectacular fall migration.



A tiny round sticker is placed on the lower wing of the butterfly which continues its southern migration—averaging 25-30 miles a day — to areas of Mexico that are more than 1,500 miles away! After wintering among many millions of their winged friends, the survivors fly partway back. Though research has revealed a great deal about the monarch, there is much that remains an amazing mystery.

For years, my mom's massive flower gardens were a fueling station for monarchs headed south. We'd ridden four-wheelers through the fields to snag ones landing on the sweet clover flowers.

One magical summer evening several summers ago, so many monarchs flew through the garden at once, my mom called in the grandchildren, the neighbors and a staff person from the local Department of Natural Resources to help. They couldn't catch and tag the monarchs fast enough to keep up with the stampede.

There have been disappointing summers as well. After my dad

worth celebrating.

died five summers ago, my mom looked forward to monarchs that didn't come.





When Grandma moved to the nursing home, my mom would fill a five-gallon bucket with monarchs for the residents to tag on the patio. The thrill of launching butterflies poked small holes in the darkness of Alzheimer's disease. It gave the residents a new story to share.

Earlier this week, I found myself driving around with a net full of monarchs, wondering who might enjoy a visit. I stopped by David Johnson's house, knowing that he has been planting milkweed and butterfly-friendly plants to attract monarchs

to his yard – he tagged and released the first one of the season. Hopefully, there will be many more.

I use caterpillars and monarchs as excuses to visit people and to do my work differently—even if it's just for a few short weeks. Yes, I've turned into my mother.

Of course, butterflies are a symbol of new life. Images of butterflies have graced banners and bulletin covers on Easter morning and at funerals. I once released monarchs at the memorial service for a little girl who died shortly after birth—a symbol of God's promise of life beyond death. Another sweet mystery we can't fully explain. To be honest, I love them for more than the obvious theological reasons.

Maybe you've heard or noticed that monarchs are diminishing. Simply put, there is less milkweed—the primary source of food for monarch caterpillars. Logging and climate changes have affected overwintering sites in Mexico. Extreme weather conditions can cut short their southern migration. *Continued page 7*

Profile of Maureen Dudley

Maureen Dudley has been a member of Prince of Peace for 31 years. She was married to Don Dudley for 66 years before his death in 2014. They have one daughter who lives in Idaho and two grown grandchildren. Maureen is of Irish decent, was raised in Dubuque, Iowa and was the youngest of four children.

She came from a very musical family and first learned tunes and chords before she could even read music. Her first steady job was playing an organ at a roller rink while in high school. From 1940-1945, Maureen was a staff organist at radio station WMT in Cedar Rapids. She was featured on a number of WMT programs including "The Family Party" "The Melodiers" and "Melodies by Maureen." Some of the advertisements promoted Maureen with "She is only 4'11" tall, but what she lacks in height, she sure makes up in musicianship!"

She was a homemaker for several years and then in 1955 Maureen began playing the organ at skating rinks, horse shows, conventions, taught for Bodines and retired in 1984. She then jumped into doing a great deal of volunteer work by playing the piano for sing-a-longs with Jan Hanson's

mom, Marion Skildum, at Lyngblomsten and other Senior Housing places for many years. In 2001, she took on the challenge of being the other half of a musical program with Jan Hanson for four years.

They took their "Name That Tune" program to the majority of senior places in St. Paul where Maureen dazzled the crowd with her uncanny ability to play music from the 1920's through the 1950's without a piece of music in front of her. Before she started to play the music she would even ask them what *key* they wanted. If Maureen couldn't play a song, it was rare indeed!

She once told Jan that she especially appreciated the interest of people guessing the name of the tune, stumping them when they did not know the tune and the unusual requests that she would get from them. Maureen had so much fun that she hated to leave each time!

Maureen is now living at EagleCrest Assisted Living and appreciates receiving the weekly bulletin and The Vine so that she can read what is happening at POP. She also looks forward to the phone calls and visits that she receives from her friends at church.

Though experts say monarchs as a species are not necessarily endangered, their awesome, mysterious migration from Canada to Mexico and back is at risk.

In some ways we are reaping the unintended consequences of decisions made years ago. Growing up in lowa, every effort was made to rid roadside ditches of the pesky, invasive milkweed and the wildflowers that serve as fuel. Herbicides used to enhance corn and soybean crops kill these other beneficial things.

It's hard to imagine a world without monarchs. I love that small things we do right now can positively impact the future. People can plant milkweed in their backyards. Or at least stop pulling it out. When we learn and teach, change and delight, we also become a part of the larger story. This is true also of us as people of faith, we play a small part in a magnificent story of God's love for us and the world. I'm glad that story includes the monarch—and you.





- 1. Develop and implement strategic plan that align and focuses our energies to make the greatest impact in the community and world.
- 2. Enhance our learning, faith formation, and spiritual growth.
- 3. Expand our reach to new people and incorporate them into the life and work of the church.
- 4. Develop a staffing plan that allows us to implement program priorities and fulfill our mission.
- 5. Enhance our stewardship to fully fund our mission.

Specifically, the 5 top task priorities for the lead pastor were identified:

- 1. Administration
- 2. Strategic Mission Planning
- 3. Building a sense of community
- 4. Preaching/Worship leadership
- 5. Spiritual formation/direction

These tasks were to be undertaken with the congregation and staff not in lieu of the congregation. So, where am I going with this information? The MSET will review the raw data and determine what SECOND set of criteria for a church staffing team is needed. SOME of the early data included the following tasks/qualities (IN NO PARTICULAR ORDER):

- > Help people understand and act upon issues of social justice
- Provide care and nurture
- > Work regularly in the development of stewardship and giving
- Bring joy and good humor to relationships
- Be creative and innovative
- > Be able to use technology and media
- > Be effective in working with youth
- > And the list goes on and on....

Just some things to pray and think about as we move toward asking you what we need....

- Lastly, we require everyone who volunteers with our children to take **Safe Church training** and submit a simple background check. This ensures the safety and well-being of everyone.


What's New this Fall for children, youth, families, for everybody! —Tammy Wilkinson

Dish Machine & Kitchen Flooring

The old dish machine has been removed and preparations made for the new machine to be installed. New flooring throughout the kitchen and dish room will be installed the week of Sept. 5-8. The new dish machine will be installed the week of Sept. 11-15. Funding for the flooring and installation comes from the proceeds of the Rooted & Reaching Campaign while funding for the dish machine comes was approved at the June semi-annual meeting.

Main Entry

You may have noticed how badly the exterior paint is fading and chipping on the metal support structure and the integrated cross. Though this was a recent installation, the dipped-galvanized metal really needed to be weathered prior to painting. The paint supplier recommended the paint that was used but, clearly, it has not performed as expected. Dan Neujahr has identified an alternate paint and supplier and is making plans to have the lower portion painted as soon as weather allows. The upper/cross portion will be painted at the same time as a lift is rented to do roofing and soffit repair on the NW corner of the building. The funding for these projects will come from the proceeds of the Rooted & Reaching Campaign.

Sanctuary Air-Conditioning

It was discovered recently that the HVAC units that service the sanctuary were not functioning properly, primarily due to clogged filters. A system for regular filter replacement has been instituted. The efficiencies of the air-handling units that supply some of the larger public areas of the church like the sanctuary are compromised by the openness of the spaces to the rest of the building (i.e. the conditioned air is not trapped in the sanctuary but flows out to other parts of the building). The Capital Improvement and Implementation Committee (CIIC) is considering these challenges as a part of future renovation planning.

Project Prioritization by CIIC

The committee met earlier this summer to evaluate the progress of projects previously a part of the Rooted & Reaching Campaign and to reprioritize any newly emerging capital projects. In addition to those mentioned above, the CIIC is proposing to move forward with the following projects this fall:

- ➤ Replace/upgrade underground power to the garage and south side of parking lot, including the feed to the exterior parking lot light. Est. project cost is \$8K.
- ➤ Replace the gym light fixtures with LED units. Est. project cost including energy rebate from Excel is \$2.5K.
- ➤ West and Office Hallway renovations including new double entry doors at SW corner, installing doors at either end of the office hallway and a suspended ceiling with new lighting throughout. Est. project cost is \$50K.
- ➤ Replace final 'older' roof-top HVAC unit which will require some roofing renovations as well. Project cost is not yet estimated.

All of the proposed funding would come from the remaining Rooted & Reaching Campaign proceeds. The council will be reviewing these project proposals at their September meeting. Questions regarding CIIC projects can be directed to Russ Stolle.
