Bishop Lull's Annual Report to Congregations

January 2017

Dear Partners in Ministry,

Then Jesus said ... 'Someone gave a great dinner and invited many. At the time for the dinner he sent his slave to say to those who had been invited, "Come; for everything is ready now." But they all alike began to make excuses. The first said to him, "I have bought a piece of land, and I must go out and see it; please accept my apologies." Another said, "I have bought five yoke of oxen, and I am going to try them out; please accept my apologies." Another said, "I have just been married, and therefore I cannot come." So the slave returned and reported this to his master. Then the owner of the house became angry and said to his slave, "Go out at once into the streets and lanes of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame." And the slave said, "Sir, what you ordered has been done, and there is still room." Then the master said to the slave, "Go out into the roads and lanes, and compel people to come in, so that my house may be filled.'" Luke 14:16-23



This parable has served as a guiding text for our work as a synod in 2016. At our Conference and Synod Assemblies, our leaders and ministers explored together what it means that God wills that "my house may be full". In drafting a statement of purpose, we discerned that for the Saint Paul Area Synod this includes the conviction that:

"Christ is renewing us today for –

deeper faith in the living God;

wider engagement in God's world;

bolder trust in God's work through us."

(Statement of Purpose, 2016)

Our common work in 2016 was marked by regular opportunities for learning by the lay leaders and rostered ministers of the synod. Over 400 persons participated in the Tool Kit for Congregational Leaders, the Stewardship Lab, two gatherings of the ministerium, the Bishop's Theological Conference, and ten formal learning cohorts this past year.

In those and other events, attention was given to racial justice as a deep and urgent concern for all members of the Saint Paul Area Synod. At our Synod Assembly, the Rev. Anthony Bateza challenged us to embrace the ways that our identity in Christ frees us to look deeply at racism

in our own daily life. In July, many gathered to mourn the death of Philando Castile and to recommit energy to building more just relationships in our communities. In September, a dozen teams from our congregations as well as the synod staff participated in a two-day training session to gain skills for addressing racial justice within our churches. As a synod, we have committed ourselves to addressing racism and racial justice in all aspects of our shared work.

In August, 24 persons from the synod participated in the Churchwide Assembly in New Orleans. Memorials adopted there included several sent forward from the Saint Paul Area Synod: repudiating the Doctrine of Discovery, calling for renewed attention to reducing gun violence, and utilizing investment screens to reduce dependence on fossil fuels. The joy and vitality of being "church together" was apparent through the six days of worship, presentations and legislative deliberations. Appreciation for the last 50 years of formal dialogue between Lutherans and Roman Catholics was expressed through a standing ovation when the document, "Declaration on the Way" was received as a statement of all that is held in common by our faith communities. What a fitting prelude that was to the observance of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, which formally began on October 31, 2016.

Five new rostered leaders were ordained or consecrated for service in this synod in 2016. They include Sister Annette Langdon, Pastor John Schwehn, Pastor Stefanie Fauth, Pastor Patrick Joiner and Sister Tashina Good. By constitutional amendments adopted at the Churchwide Assembly, we will now address all Associates in Ministry, Deaconesses and Diaconal Ministers as "Deacons" and are grateful for the three dozen persons who serve in these ministries of Word and Service in this synod.

2016 also brought changes to the staff in the Office of the Bishop. We welcomed Michael Gold, receptionist and office assistant; the Rev. Joe Lees, assistant to the bishop for vital congregations, vital partnerships; the Rev. Tom Jenkins, part-time stewardship coordinator; and Deacon Krista Lind, assistant to the bishop for vocational formation. This was also the year we said farewell and godspeed to the Rev. Lamont Koerner, Julie Keefe and Sister Noreen Stevens.

At year's end, it is a gift to look back upon the fruitful efforts, the faithful service and the generous mission support that allows us to be on this journey together. It is a privilege to serve as the bishop of the 113 congregations and mission starts that make up the Saint Paul Area Synod.

Pastoral Reports Pastor Marilyn Breckenridge Interim Pastor for Congregational Care

I give thanks always for you, remembering before our God your work of faith, your labor of love, and your steadfastness of hope in Jesus Christ.

I say this after just three months as serving as your part time interim Congregational Care pastor.

Ministry Covenant

My Covenant with you for Interim Pastoral Ministry at Prince of Peace included the following three specific areas:

- Direct Pastoral Care Ministries
- Support Senior Ministries
- Collaborate with Lead Pastor and Worship Committee on Seasonal Worship Planning

Concerning pastoral care ministries, I have identified so far about 26 people that I am keeping in touch with on a regular basis. Seven of these members, I visit every month bringing Holy Communion. The others who are able to come to church, I try to visit or contact by phone to check in on them every other month. In addition, congregational care extends to home and hospital visits and follow up calls or visits on all ages, assisting Pastor Peter Christ as needed.

It is a joy to be working with the vital Senior Ministry Advocates and the active Befrienders who are very much involved in the ministry to seniors. I thank Anne Haugan for going with me on some of my first visits and helping me get acquainted. An area of ministry to seniors that is being worked on is providing transportation to those who would like to come to church but don't drive.

I have also enjoyed the opportunity to preach and administer the Sacraments and being part of seasonal worship planning with Pastor Peter Christ and Milt Warkentien. Prince of Peace is fortunate to have the many musical groups that are so good who enhance worship every Sunday. I have never heard a Bell Choir as good as the one here.

Mission

Children's Ministry provides engaging opportunities for children to connect with one another and grow in their faith. It is also an excellent opportunity for members of the Prince of Peace community to share their gifts and talents with the children by volunteering to teach, serve, provide snacks and much more. A variety of lessons are taught in differentiation style to maximize the greatest learning potential of our young learners.

Telling the Story:

Summer Programming

Summer Programming was divided into four different opportunities throughout the summer months. Vacation Bible School (VBS) was offered to children ages 3 years through 6th grade. Children are engaged in learning about the Bible through music, story, arts and crafts, science, and much more. Little Sparks is a program that is geared towards

children ages 3 years -2nd grade. Similar to VBS children learn stories through play, outdoor activities, and art. Sparklers is a program that is geared towards grades 3-6th. Last summer we focused on learning our Bible stories through Lego creations and art. New to our programming this year was Photo Camp for 3rd graders and up. This was an opportunity to explore photography and engage in fellowship with other children. In addition, we had several youth (grades 7-12) volunteer for all summer programming. We had a wonderful summer last year and look forward to opening up more opportunities for children and families.

Spooky Music

Spooky Music is held once a year, usually, on the last Wednesday of October. This year was our 9th Annual event and Children's Ministry was excited to sponsor the event for people of all ages. We consider this event a great outreach to both our members and the community, plus it is a wonderful opportunity to raise money to support Central Park Elementary School. We encouraged members of our congregation to invite friends and family to the event.

Sunday School

Sunday School provides engaging opportunities for children to connect with one another and grow in their faith. After Pastor John Klawiter's departure, we hired interim youth leader Cassie Hartnett to lead the PoP youth until the end of summer. Cassie met with the youth during Sunday mornings and Wed. evenings for faith formation both in church and at local coffee shops, the roller skating rink, movie theaters, the bowling alley, the Como Water Park, and at church for a LOCK-IN! The youth group once again prepared and served a delicious Palm Sunday Brunch, and the youth were impressive in their ability to take on leadership roles. Four high school students and

Cassie traveled in late July to Rapid City, SD, with the Jacob's Well youth group. There they learned about the Lakota experience in the Black Hills region: in the city, on the reservation & in the church. It was a moving experience for them to learn about the history, culture and spirituality of the Lakota! In August, we were sad to see Cassie go. We wished her well as she left for her studies at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City.

During the fall of 2016, youth have been meeting on Wed. evenings with Pastor Peter Christ for fellowship and faith formation using the ELCA "Faith Lens" Bible Study. In Sept., 7th–12th graders gathered for a kick-off evening of pizza and bowling. In October, ten youth and adult leaders volunteered by packing food at Feed My Starving Children. That month we also welcomed three Muslim youth along with their Imam, 3 mothers and their church leader from the local Al Ihsan mosque to PoP for an Ecumenical Outreach & Understanding Event. We experienced a great exchange of ideas, heard the youth's creative poems, observed their active prayer, and found common ground in so many ways that lead to greater understanding of our faiths as "sons and daughters of Abraham." In November, ten youth and three adult leaders visited the Luther: Art & Reformation Exhibit at Minneapolis Institute of Arts with pizza fellowship afterwards.

In Nov., youth committee leaders and Pastor Peter welcomed clergy and youth leaders from five other local churches in a Round Table Gathering to hear about how their youth programs were going. We shared ideas and will hope to collaborate on youth activities in the near future. Pastor Peter recently surveyed the youth to evaluate the fall programming and plan for the coming months. The Youth Committee's search continues for a candidate for the position of a Youth Director who "shall seek to foster Christian community through building relationships with young people that strengthen their commitment to the church and growth in faith in Jesus." 

Our Calling/ Mission and Vision


Prince of Peace is one of 14 congregations partnering with Twin Cities Habitat for Humanity to build affordable homes. We call this consortium the Holy Hammers. Habitat homes are sold to families who need a lower cost entry into home ownership via zero interest loans plus up to 500 hours of sweat equity. These families go through a rigorous qualifying to ensure that they have both the need for a home and the means to pay for and maintain it.

TELL: The Highlights (The Story)

The 2016 Holy Hammers house was built at 11 Maryland Ave E in St. Paul. Prince of Peace had 14 volunteer workers provide 21 worker days across 7 calendar days during the build – from early April into early July.

Also, 9 Prince of Peace volunteers provided snacks and lunch on 2 work days

in late April. The Prince of Peace congregation donated \$3,712 towards building the house via the budgeted benevolence (\$2,500) and the Lenten offerings (\$1,212).



ARE WE DONE WITH THE BUILDING PROJECTS?

"Are we there yet?" Just as the question is asked by a passenger on a journey, We ask the same question as we progress on the list of building projects. Although much has been done, including the biggest projects like roof, furnace, and window replacements, we are not at our destination yet.

With only a few minor tasks left to finish, the new bathroom is done and the Sacristy is in a new location. This was a big project that took the skills and time of Dan Neujahr, Russ Stolle, Ron Neujahr, and many others to finish.

With a balance of just over \$125,000 in the Rooted & Reaching account, we still have projects that will be done. There are two items that should be put in the "must do" category:



 replace flooring in kitchen & dishwasher room—Some of the floor in the dishwasher room was removed during construction of the new handicapped/family-accessible bathroom and relocation of the Sacristy. The rest of the floor in the kitchen is also past due for replacement.

The rest of the list is longer than there are funds available, so we should take some time to prioritize them:

- west entrance vestibule and hallway doors
- energy efficient interior and exterior lighting
- outdoor worship space
- program space reconfiguration
- other projects from original list
- new projects

The Thrivent loan, used to complete the most urgent roof repairs and other highest-priority projects in the early "Replace, Reconstruct & Repair" phase, was paid off completely this past fall.

So the answer is: "We're almost there."
