On Sunday, April 15th, we will commemorate the conclusion of our 60th anniversary year with "Charter Member"


Sunday. St. Paul Area Synod Bishop Patricia Lull will be our



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From Milt: Walking with Jesus in Lent

We've been looking at Jesus's "I AM" statements over Lent. As we head into Easter Sunday and the Easter Season, it is important for us to ask ourselves how we can live our life like Jesus's I AM statements. Last month I used the phrase "I AM......Am I?" I'd like to look farther into that statement.

What global, continental and local issues are important to you?

How do we support the issues that are important to us? How do we take the lessons our faith teaches us out into the world? I liked the image that Pastor Lynn recently used: A finger saying Jesus is number one, or a finger pointing out others' deficiencies. This image really got me to thinking about "I Am.....Am I."

Jesus said he was many things. Are we saying "I AM," or are we pointing our fingers and saying are you, or worse? Are we listening to others' issues and trying to come up with solutions, or are we pointing our fingers and saying you're wrong, or worse?

As we journey through this Easter Season, may we be conscious of where our finger is pointing. Is it pointing skyward proclaiming Jesus as our savior and guide, or is it pointing at others, proclaiming what we see as their deficiencies and maybe ignoring our own deficiencies? May we all keep our fingers pointing skyward. As many of our Easter hymns state: "Alleluia, Jesus is Risen!"

April 8 – Desmond Tutu called Bryan Stevenson "America's young Nelson Mandela." Join the Social Concerns discussion of the highly praised, award winning memoir *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson, on the unfairness of the justice system. This will be led by BJ Metzger.

April 15 -- A Conversation with Bishop Patricia Lull of the St. Paul Synod.

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From Pastor Lynn: Footprints

Dear Friends,

This weekend, our daughter, Sarah, had a couple of extra days off so we spent some time in Milwaukee. Although it was colder than I hoped -- the sun was shining -- so we took a long walk along beautiful Lake Michigan.



As we made our way along the edge of the wet sand looking for interesting rocks and other treasures, we left a trail of footprints that were quickly reclaimed by the waves. Looking behind us, I was reminded of the popular poem "Footprints in the Sand." In a dream, the author walks along the beach with Jesus, with scenes from her life appearing across the sky. During difficult times, she notices just one set of footprints in the sand instead of two and worries that she has been abandoned at her lowest. Jesus reassures her that he had carried her safely through those times.

It is a beautiful poem — and so popular it can be found emblazoned on pillows and wall hangings and coffee mugs and bookmarks. However, as I walked along the sand of the uncrowded beach, I thought about my own faith over time, including periods of great difficulty. For me, the footprints poem paints an incomplete picture.

For example, where is the deep groove along the beach where I was reluctantly dragged - being led in a direction I did not want to go? Perhaps I felt called to be more generous than I intended, or to end an unhealthy relationship that I treasured, or to take a stand that made me uncomfortable or unpopular. Sometimes I have followed Jesus grudgingly instead of joyfully.

What about the times my footprints could be found heading in the opposite direction from those of Christ? When I had no concern for my neighbor, when I behaved selfishly, when I hurt others.

And how could there possibly be just two sets of footprints along the beach? A truer picture of a walk of faith would be a beach trampled with footprints – the countless imprints of those who came before us, those with whom we have walked, those whom we loved and loved us, those with whom we disagreed, stepping upon their feet as we walked. Teachers who challenged, family members who supported, childhood mentors who inspired, doctors who chided, church members who modeled faithfulness and playfulness, friends and strangers, children and elders. So many footprints.

We walk in the sandy footsteps of the heroines from the Bible we encounter during our mid-week Lenten services—Eve, Lydia with her purple cloth, Rahab, Mary and so many more. Our relationship with Christ, rather than being a serene stroll along a lonely beach, connects us to a vast cloud of witnesses.

As I walked along with my own dear family, the waves gathered up the footprints surrounding us and carried them away, leaving a clean slate before us and behind us. Our life of faith includes this too! We are called during this season of preparation for Easter to wade in the promises of baptism — claimed as God's own beloved children, washed clean and freed from sin and death.

I thank God for you, for the gift of his Son, and for our overlapping footprints.

There was no paper copy of the March Vine Newsletter. These articles were on the website. I am adding to the back of this April Vine, so that those who don't have access to the internet are able to enjoy the thoughts of Milt W., Pastor Peter and Pastor Lynn. Thank you for your patience in this transition of the Vine from hard copy to the internet.

Milt's March article From Milt: Walking with Jesus in Lent

We are now fully in the Lenten season. I hope you've been finding the "I am" statements and the "Her-story"/Holden services meaningful. In looking at the "journey to the cross stories" in the Bible, I've really noticed how often women are mentioned, or named.

This wasn't a total surprise, but there were a few times I hadn't remembered them being there. I've often wondered why women in many churches aren't allowed a more prominent role in leading worship. Women have long been the "educators" in the church via Sunday School and Bible Studies, so then why not in leading worship? Why did it take so long to allow women pastors in the ELCA and its preceding synods.

Many women have had a great influence on my faith, both here at Prince of Peace and growing up, so I guess I wasn't fully aware of how male-dominated religion could be. It's just mind boggling to me that people are judged to be better equipped to lead religion because of gender, race, age, or anything else.

"We All Are One in Mission" ELW 576 verse one:

"We all are one in mission; we all are one in call, our varied gifts united by Christ the Lord of all. A single great commission compels us from above to plan and work together that all may know Christ's love."

Seems simple enough; we all have gifts to use, to proclaim Christ's love to the world. I think this is what Jesus is getting at when he states that he is the vine and we are the branches. In looking at the "I am" statements we're studying this Lenten season, my biggest question for myself and all of us is "am I?"

Am I leading my life Christ-like as a follower of the Vine, Bread of Life, Light for the World, Door, Good Shepherd and Resurrection? What does it mean for each of us to be a follower of the "I am"?

Are we like Peter when he denies knowing Christ, or are we truly branches of Christ's love and life? Do we help keep Christ's light shining in the world, or are we more like Judas and help arrest Jesus? Do we enter the door that Jesus opens for us, or do we walk away to find our own way? Am I a follower, or a wanna-be? Do I welcome women as leaders of the faith, or am I one that blocks their path?

From Pastor Peter Are these burdens too great?

For as long as kids have been playing pick-up baseball, the same trick for deciding who goes first has been used. A player from one team grabs and holds a bat and then a player from the other team grabs the bat just above the hand already on the bat. The players alternate grabbing the bat, ever higher, and whoever is last able to grab the bat at the end wins. I'm guessing you might have used this or a similar version too.



I think about these hands piling on top of each other trying to be the last on top, trying to win, when I consider the pile of big things going on, all seemingly competing for attention, all trying to "win" the moment. Today it's renewed threats of nuclear weapons pointed at the U.S. Last week it was gun violence and school shootings. Just before that the #MeToo movement around sexual harassment and before that worsening race relations, North Korean aggression, growing economic disparity, election tampering... the list seems to go on and on. Truthfully, I don't want any of them to "win." I'd like my attention to be anywhere else but on these big and awful things.

The Olympics were a nice distraction. This was mostly true until a troubled young man decided to fire his gun in the hallways of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School on February 14th.

That day was Ash Wednesday and I was busy preparing for our two worship services that day and finding a last-minute Valentine's Day present for my wife. I learned about the tragedy in Florida, just before the start of our 7 p.m. service. Something else had now reached the top of the pile.

Ash Wednesday launched us on our Lenten journey and I'll confess that this year's journey has started in a particularly dark place for me. I'm guessing that you might be feeling this way too. I'm especially anxious to get through these forty days as I'm more than ready to experience to joy of Easter morning. This cross is already too heavy, the burdens this world keeps piling on are adding weight that I'm struggling to bear. Suffocating in bad news, the good news is getting harder and harder to hear. But Lent is about listening and if we open our ears, this journey we're on may just reveal something to ease our way.

Speaking to his disciples and those who had begun to follow him, Jesus offers these words to them (and us) who struggle under the weight:

"Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

- Matthew 11:28-30

That God might know these burdens are great and offers to share the load with us suggest to us something really important. God is aware of our troubles and God has a limitless capacity to carry more weight on our behalf. To go on struggling alone is foolish. Alone, our crosses will always be too great. But in sharing this weight with God gives us a chance at life once more. Of course, this doesn't mean God alone will take care of gun violence, aggressive foreign powers, sexual harassment or any of the other big awful problems facing us, like a fairy godmother waving a magic wand. *Continued on next page.*



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No, it means that God is with us, prepared to shoulder some real weight so that we have something left to see these challenges through. With God's help and with God's wisdom, we will start to solve some of these big awful problems that keep rising to the top of the pile.

This year, during Lent, I invite you to join me in answering Jesus' call. Bring the burdens of this world to God. Be reminded that you're not alone and that the one who loves has an unlimited capacity to make that love shine into the darkest of places, calling forth life. No burden is too great that, with God's help, we can't carry it. Thanks be to God.

From March From Pastor Lynn: Snowfall Brings Out the Best in Us

Dear Friends,

There's something about a significant snowfall that brings out the best in us. Neighbors with snow plows work their way up and down the sidewalk. Strangers cheerfully lend a hand to stranded residents and motorists, often without being asked or thanked.

Road conditions after this week's second heavy snowfall were so slick and unpredictable, even seasoned motorists found themselves hopelessly stuck, rear-ended, or headed the wrong way. Unfortunately, the most skilled, determined and embarrassed driver cannot always extract a vehicle from the trouble deep snow creates without assistance. (I know. I've tried.) Because there's something about snow that unifies us, people seem more eager to lend a hand – or a push – to those in need and are more willing to accept help rather than struggle alone.

In life, not all of us have the same skills or resources to negotiate the unexpected slick spots. Someone suddenly unemployed after thirty years with the same company might find himself spinning his wheels helplessly, unable to get a good grip on the ground beneath. A recent college graduate may have her wheels pointed one way, and suddenly she is moving in a direction she never intended to go. The loss of a loved one through death or conflict can leave us dented and broken-down, uncertain how to pick up the pieces and move forward. Terrible news, near and far, can lead us to believe that our troubles – and the world's – are so deep and heavy, we'll never dig out from under them.

Sometimes it takes a good snowstorm to point out what is always true – we need each other. The challenges and joys of life are intended to be shared. The ways God calls us to participate in this shared life make a difference for us and for our neighbors. In his letter encouraging the church in Corinth, the apostle Paul uses the body as an example of how we are to function in our life together each with unique gifts to share. When one suffers, all suffer. When one rejoices, the joy is shared. (I Corinthians 12). Sometimes when someone around us is stuck, no one can move forward until we all pitch in to help. (I added that part and hope Paul would agree).

As the season of Lent continues and we trudge through what remains of winter, we give thanks for the gift of relationship and for the ways we are called to care for one another, to problem solve, to encourage and challenge and love. I'm grateful for you and for the ministry we share.
