

# Wednesdays in Lent: Listen to HER-story

Students of history know that those who tell the story have great influence on how the story gets heard. One of the most challenging aspects to our history as Christians is how influenced its telling has been by the embedded systems of culture and society. For far too long, patriarchy (systems that benefit men with status and power) has served as the dominant societal, political, legal, and religious structure throughout our Christian history. But such a male-centered orienta



tion seems to suggest that we've not experienced the fullness of the world God has created throughout all of time. In responding to a recent flap over female voices from the pulpit, Christian journalist and writer Sarah Thebarge responded,

"The creation story in Genesis says that in order to reflect God's image in the world, God created men and women. So, just like Mao Zedong's insistence that "Women hold up half the sky," there should be a similar statement in the Christian tradition that says, "Women hold half the voice of God."

Similarly, Thebarge also describes what is lost when we only hear the biblical story from a patriarchal posture,

"Because breath is breath, air is air, but it sounds different flowing through a flute than it does a bassoon. A string is a string and wood is wood, but sound resonates differently in the heart of a violin than it does in the heart of a cello. Insisting, in spite of more accurate (and generous) interpretations of Scripture that men be the only voices heard from the pulpits of our churches, is like an orchestra that only has cellos and bassoons. It's heavy. It's masculine. It's only half the story. It's only half the notes."

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# **Wednesdays in Lent: Listen to HER-story**

During this coming season of Lent, we're hoping to hear a story that's richer in tone and deeper in harmony. On Wednesday evenings we'll gather to worship around Marty Haugen's "Holden Evening Prayer," anchored in its liturgical beauty by Mary's "Magnificat." From the scriptures we'll hear rarely told stories of biblical heroines. And we're calling for those in our midst to share stories of more contemporary heroines that have shaped and influenced our lives.

Do you have a story about a contemporary heroine in your life? Perhaps a family member, teacher, colleague, or neighbor made an impact in your life, the results of which are still evident? Would you be willing to share your stories with us as a part of our weekly Wednesday worship at 7 p.m.?

Contact Pastor Peter, pick a date the works and then work together to prepare your "HER-story" to be told. With your help, we'll give voice to the other half of the story.

through the unique lenses of feminist studies. What new insights can we gain from reading the Bible this way? We will take a fresh look at selected women in the Bible.



We're already a month into 2018 and Lent is now just around the corner. This is always an interesting transitional period for me. Epiphany is one of my favorite times of the year, with the light imagery and service/discipleship texts and then comes Lent and eventually the suffering of Jesus. Sometimes it takes me awhile to get from the joy of Epiphany to the different moods I find myself in during Lent.

This year Ash Wednesday is on Valentine's Day, and for me that seems so fitting; after all, love is what Jesus is all about. Jesus suffers and dies to save us from our sin. Can love be greater than that? This Lent I hope to focus on how I can take the joy of Epiphany and the love of Christ throughout my Lenten journey. As we journey towards the cross this Lenten season, how can you use the love of Christ in your life?

Pastor Lynn just preached about the ordinary being extraordinary. How can we, ordinary people, make a difference in the world? How can we, ordinary people show the love of Jesus to the world? How can we be living examples of the love Jesus showed all of us on the cross? I use the footprints poem often, but I feel it is very appropriate today: Jesus walking beside us when life is good; the love of friendship, and Jesus carrying us when life is hard; the love of our savior. Jesus calls us, the ordinary, to be a disciple. What an honor that is.

I love the hymn "I Want Jesus to Walk with Me." This hymn talks about Jesus walking along with us in all our pilgrim journeys, through all our trials and troubles. I've always wanted a verse about walking with us through all our joys, too. I have had many more joys in my life than sorrows, for which I am grateful. My prayer for each of us this Lenten season is that we all know the love of Jesus and that we all know that we can be a difference in the world by sharing that same love.







# From Peter: "Building a Staff for Mission"

Over the past six months, we've been blessed by the efforts of the Mission Staffing Exploration Team\* (MSET), the group that was charged by the congregation to propose a staffing configuration that would best support the mission of Prince of Peace. A group that represented the diversity of our community was convened last summer and began by looking deeply at how we go about the variety of ministry tasks and how we're called to be in service to God's world.

We quickly realized the need to expand upon our existing mission, moving beyond understanding 'who we are' and towards 'what we are to be about.' This led to the following expanded sense of our mission and vision:

We are claimed, gathered and sent to build the Church and love the World. We will realize this mission as we 1) deepen our sense of how God's story and activity shape life and 2) co-create with God to practice transforming love in the world.



Allowing our work to be shaped by this description, the MSET was able to objectively consider alternatives for aligning our staff roles to better serve this mission and vision. As a result, we were able to create the space necessary to imagine how God could work through a re-designed staffing configuration to help us become a more effective community of faith, located here in the heart of Roseville. After a lengthy, investigatory and listening period, a new staffing configuration was presented to the full congregation at its semi-annual meeting on January 28.

The gathered assembly voted strongly in favor to accept the report and recommendations of the MSET and now the work begins to fill the positions identified in the first phase of implementing the configuration.

The immediate good news is that two of the key positions are already filled. Erika Coe will continue to serve as a part-time Youth Director, integrating ministry with our Junior and High School youth within the broader faith formation efforts of the church. And I will continue to serve as your called Lead Pastor with some re-aligning and re-imaging of how my role will be shaped in relation to the rest of the ministry leadership teams.

I now look forward to the addition of some key pastoral leaders. First, the position that will prove to be my primary collaborator in ministry will be the Associate Pastor for Faith Formation. Recognizing this congregation's underlying desire to build up and strengthen its life in faith, a re-imagined focus on spiritual development across the generations will be the primary task of our pastoral leaders. We also expect to see this faith formation work carried out in a manner that's fully integrated into our worship, education, community-care and service lives.

Supporting our efforts and acknowledging the shifting demographics of our congregation, we'll also be adding a position for a part-time Visitation and Congregational Care Pastor. This leader will be tending to the increasing opportunity we have to offer care, love and support to folks as life takes new twists and turns. As the past 16 months of working with Interim Congregational Care Pastors Marilyn and Lynn has shown, the elders of our congregation are finding an increased need for connectivity to our community in this way. Supported by the Associate Pastor and myself, what a gift it will be to have someone dedicated to our ministry in this way.

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The call and contracting processes for both of these pastoral positions is slightly different and we're now actively recruiting members to serve on our call and interview committees. The congregation will be asked to formally elect the members of the call committee for the Associate Pastor position. An interview committee supported by the Personnel Committee will conduct the search for the Visitation & Congregational Care Pastor, which the council will formally covenant for ministry. Deacon Krista Lind of the St. Paul Area Synod will be supporting Prince of Peace through the selection process for both positions.

Please join me in praying that God continue to guide and shape our efforts and all the deliberations to come. And in giving thanks for all the prior work that has led us to this point. I couldn't be more excited about our future and am anxious to discover who will be joining us in the next chapter of our story.

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# Pastor Lynn: "A Story Worth Telling"

Dear Friends,

I'm not sure when I started reading obituaries, but most days I do. Sometimes the pages are full of notices about people who lived long full lives. They often include a photograph of a much younger version of the deceased – sometimes in a military uniform or with a head full of pin curls. Other days, the deaths of children or women my own age tug at my heart.



Some death notices highlight a person's significant contributions to a career or military service, loving relationships, hard-won sobriety, passion for a hobby, a valiant struggle with illness or a deep faith. Some notices say very little at all. Words like "peacefully" and "cancer" and "Alzheimer's" and "beloved" and "unexpectedly" stick out for me. I wonder about those carefully chosen words and the stories behind them.

One of my greatest privileges as a pastor is to hear and share the stories of those who have died. Sitting with family and friends, together we scratch the surface of the many joys, struggles, relationships, and passions that make up a life. There are always surprises in the story-telling when someone will exclaim – "I never knew!"

Everyone has a story worth telling, remembering and sharing – this is how we make sense of our lives and often it is in the remembering that we recognize the thread of God's presence with us. It is through humankind and our stories that God has always been at work in the world. You have a story to share – right now! You don't need to write a memoir to begin sharing your story with others or to learn more about the people you love. You can begin with simple conversation starters:

- 1. Tell me about your early years.
- 2. What were your parents like?
- 3. Talk about your education.
- 4. Did you or anyone in your family serve in the military?
- 5. What's one value you have that you want the people you love to share?
- 6. How do you celebrate the holidays?
- 7. Who taught you how to drive?
- 8. What do you love to do?
- 9. Tell me about your faith life. Who taught you about Jesus?
- 10. Pull out old pictures and talk about the people in them.

I am grateful to serve this faith community, Prince of Peace, where kindness and compassion abound in both life and death – in well-timed visits and phone calls, in your prayer ministry, in the flurry of sympathies shared, of wordless hugs, of lunches prepared and served, where stories are shared and honored. The apostle Paul writes:

"God comes alongside us when we go through hard times, and before you know it, God brings us alongside someone else who is going through hard times so that we can be there for that person just as God was there for us."

—2 Corinthians 1:4-5 (The Message).

# The Shape I AM: A Lenten Worship Series

Following up on our Epiphany series, "Body Images," we're stepping away from the lectionary on Sundays during Lent to help tell a slightly more nuanced story. The goal of this Lenten journey is to more deeply explore the Jesus who has come to live among us but who has also come to die for our sake. Digging into the "I AM" statements in the Gospel of John give us an opportunity to do just this. The good news that John shares helps to reveal the truth of the human/divine essence of Jesus while at the same time underscoring our own human need to be in relationship with the divine. Our series is formed around a study of John written by Karoline Lewis, Luther Seminary preaching professor and John scholar.



#### She writes,

"The "I AM" statements are more than just a novelty of the Fourth Gospel — they reveal, in all fullness (John 1:16), the identity of Jesus. "Obviously," you might be thinking. But Lent is the season to remember one very important thing about what it means to be a Christian: that when Jesus goes to the cross, there goes God."

At the Adult Forum between services each Sunday, participants will wrestle with these questions:

- What do the I AM statements of Jesus in John's gospel call us to do in the world?
- What are the implications for community outreach, support of mission work, and social justice?
