Since we began our journey with the Narrative Lectionary, we've heard stories of how God makes promises to God's people and to all creation and is faithful in keeping those promises.

From our very first Sunday with the Noah story, God promises to work with and through God's people regardless of all that we might do to live outside of that promise. God built on this promise to Sarah and Abraham that they and their descendants would be blessed to be a blessing for all the world.



As a reminder of God's promise, a rainbow has hung in our sanctuary, under which we've gathered to hear more and more stories of God's faithfulness and of a vision for how to live in response. This promise and the vision that is born from it continues to shape our lives yet today. Even though we and the world seemingly conspire to deny the promised truth, we are called to live in the hope that God will never be separated from us.

In this Advent season, we hear the words of the prophets pointing us to another revelation, and the rainbow-colored promise will reveal something is being made new yet again. God is pushing back against the darkness that wants to overtake us. Come to this community of faith during December, bringing your hurts and longings, your questions and curiosities. Together, waiting for the promised, we might live in hope for the savior to come.

As we enter into the busy holiday season, what a joy it is to have this expanded team to collaborate with on so many aspects of our shared ministry. I'm especially pleased with the work we're doing with children, youth and families, including the re-design of our confirmation program. Both Pastor Betsy and Cori, our Youth Director have really rolled up their sleeves to bring a new vitality to our efforts. Likewise, Pastor Ruth has added some welcome richness to our community's work in caring for one another.



Here are a few notes on what we've been up to this past month...

#### Staff & Leadership Notes

- The Nominations Committee (Stephanie Hogen & Milt Warkentien) has begun recruiting for the next "class" of elected leaders plus continuing to look for folks to fill current vacancies. One of those vacancies is on the Nominating Committee itself. Please contact myself or any committee member if you're interested in serving in leadership role during 2019.
- Let's give thanks for the efforts of the Interview Committee for the Funeral Coordinator position. Following up on the vision discerned during last spring's "Community Conversation on Funeral Ministry," the council has endorsed the work of the interview committee in support of naming Barb Lyman as Funeral Coordinator, and to help us serve families that are experiencing the loss of loved ones from our community. This is work that Barb has already helped to facilitate in the past so her affirmed presence is a most welcome addition to this important ministry.
- Barry Brahier, long-time member and past council-president, has agreed to serve as the chairperson for our new "Generosity Committee." The work that Barry is now tasked with leading is centered on how our community will steward the recent bequest from Rose Diestler's estate. Please contact Barry or me if you are interested in lending yourself to this effort.
- On Nov. 17, the staff gathered together for a 1/2 day retreat. It was a wonderful opportunity for staff, new and old, to get to know one another and to review the work we are doing as a team in helping to realize the mission and ministry of Prince of Peace. One tool that we explored together was the "<u>StrengthsFinder</u>" inventory developed by psychologist Don Clifton. We look forward to digging even more deeply into this helpful resource.



### **Program Notes**

• Incorporating "Telling Our Story" into worship on non-communion Sundays has allowed us to highlight a spectrum of ways in Prince of Peace is being the church for the sake of the world. In October we lifted up the wonderful work and legacy now left behind by the hat knitting ministry that has come to conclusion, and we enjoyed a wonderful service of installation for Pastor Betsy. In November, our BkB partnership with our brothers and sisters in Bomalang'ombe, Tanzania, was highlighted in conjunction with our annual Tanzania dinner and fundraise and we had a wonderful chance to celebrate and bless the work of the knitting group that supports our prayer shawl ministry.

- The "Cloud of Saints" has been a delightful addition to our worship space again this year and helped us properly celebrate on All Saints Day at the start of November. Thanks to Erika Warkentien for cutting out letters, Tara Emerson for organizing volunteers to string them together and Monday Crew with Worship Committee volunteers to hang it all up.
- The new church year, starting with the season of Advent, begins on Sunday, Dec. 2. Our Advent theme, "Waiting for the Promised," echoes what we have heard this fall from the ancestors of our faith like Noah, Sarah, Abraham, Joseph, and David as well as the prophets like Micah and Isaiah. The promises that God has made will soon take on an incarnate reality in the person of Jesus Christ. Once again our gathering spaces will be transformed and our times gathered in worship, faith formation and fellowship will help to reinforce the faithfulness of God to all God's people.
- If you aren't already, consider joining one of our smaller ministry groups like a monthly Women's Circle, the weekly Old Guy's coffee and text study, Theology on Tap at Ol' Mexico, or any number of musical ensembles that gather to rehearse. Time spent together will also help to reinforce this life of faith we're called to explore.

#### And finally...

Last month, Pastor Betsy and I were blessed by the opportunity to gather with many of our colleagues in the St. Paul Area Synod at the Bishop's Annual Theological Conference. This year's guest and keynote speaker was ELCA Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton. As one who is called to bring the gospel truth to others to hear, it was especially helpful to hear how Bishop Eaton also struggles with the current polarized political landscape. Her encouragement to us pastors to first listen deeply to the Word and then to listen deeply to one another is a helpful reminder that, though this work can be perilous at times, if we find our truth in that Word and in those relationships, God will be revealed. I give thanks to God that you have entrusted me with such a task.

### Pastor Ruth: Advent is a Season of Waiting

I like to think of waiting as a spiritual practice because it tends to be one of those things that we struggle with accepting and doing. Years ago I had an eye-opening experience regarding waiting. My daughter had twice weekly appointments, which for me involved a lot of driving and a lot of waiting. The waiting room was a revolving door of parents and kids and I got to observe many different styles of waiting.



There were the parents who had other kids to entertain so they were in the

toy corner managing play time (I didn't need to do that). There were parents who dropped their child off and went to run errands (I didn't have anywhere to go). There were the parents who chatted loudly on their cell phones (annoying). There were parents who, through sheer necessity, took that hour-long opportunity to nap (no idea how they did that).

None of these styles of waiting fit me so I tried other things. I brought a book but it was too hard to read with all the noise. I tried to listen to podcasts on my headphones, but I liked to listen to podcasts while walking instead of sitting. I would text friends, but that didn't take up an hour. I finally brought some needlework with me to keep my hands busy and my attention focused.

One day a new woman appeared in the waiting room. At the top of the hour her cell phone rang out with a loud, clear tone and she unfurled a mat, knelt on it, and began to pray. In the midst of the kid noise, cell phone chatter, snow boots and winter jackets tumbling out of cubbies, and the revolving door chaos of that waiting room this woman prayed. She didn't need a sanctuary, a special candle, a sabbath day – the waiting room became a prayer room.

My mind lit up with the possibility of a new kind of waiting that she modeled for me and my twice weekly waiting time changed after that day. I decided that I too could pray in that space, in my head and in my heart, because prayer existed in the midst of waiting and in the midst of appointments, carpools, grocery lists, medical forms, and lost mittens. I started to pray for the other parents in that room. I prayed for their kids working on PT or OT skills to help their bodies and brains. I prayed for the staff who challenged and were cheerleading kids all day long.

I began to look forward to my waiting room time knowing that that time prayer and reflection was just waiting for me to embrace it, just like God is always there, ready to shower us with grace. And I began to see that my waiting room/prayer room time affected the rest of my day as I moved into helping with homework, dinner prep, dog walks, and bedtime routines. My new way of waiting changed me.

How will you wait during Advent? How might waiting change you this season?

# **Confirmation Reimagined**

Confirmation looks a bit different this year! Instead of meeting weekly on Wednesday evening, we're trying something new. 7th and 8th graders meet for a 4-hour "mini retreat" one Sunday afternoon a month with Pastors Betsy and Peter and Cori, our youth director.

This more intensive time together includes a variety of activities and learning techniques – storytelling, digging into the Bible, drawing, skits, games, discussion time, highs and lows, quiet reflection, discussion, and sharing a meal together.

This year students are focusing on the biblical narrative with the goal of being able to "Tell our Story" on a deeper level and understand how faith applies to life. We'll also look at parts of the catechism.

Each month we'll generally have one other activity. In November that was attending "The Lutheran Plot to Kill Hitler," a play about Dietrich Bonheoffer set during World War II.

Also new this year are Confirmation Journals. Faith is not something that you just learn from a book; faith is something that we need to practice. Rather than a required number of sermon notes and service hours, students are encouraged to participate in and write about a variety of faith experiences. This can include learning activities, service projects, worshipping, service in worship, and teaching younger children.

O come, O King of nations, come, O Cornerstone that binds in one: refresh the hearts that long for you; restore the broken, make us new.

This verse seems so appropriate in today's world filled with way too much darkness. We WAIT for the promise Jesus brings to the world: unity and peace, renewal of our faith, healing for those in need. I guess Peace, Hope, Joy, Love, etc. ... will still be around. No matter how you phrase it, "Waiting for the Promised" is about waiting for Love, Hope, Peace, Joy, etc. ... that Christ brings to the world.

May we all find Love, Hope, Peace, Joy, etc., this year, in all we do, say, live and dream. Milty

#### 11/24/18 Property Update Matt Hogen, Property and Deb Cordes

It's timely to provide an update on many things property related. Some big projects and some small. **PARKING LOT** – It would be wonderful to say the parking lot is done... but as we all know, it isn't. Delay after delay was caused by the significant rainfall and then the cold. The underlayment (soil) was too soft for the equipment to lay the last part of the base course. Some damage was done during the hard rains that will need to be repaired.

- Spring will see the completion of the parking lot project. (This also allows time for the Parking Lot Funding to ramp up for the final payments that will be due.)
- Temporary striping is planned and I am working out the timing.
- Dumpsters have been moved back and will remain in place until the final work next spring.
- There is an issue with access that may or may not be worked out on a temporary basis. All current options would be affected by snow plowing and likely ripped off. We don't have an answer but will keep on looking at options.

**PLOWING** – Gunard will be the company providing plowing this year. Payments will be made on an as used basis. While I checked for a fixed fee contract, the quote was approximately \$1,700 more than the average paid on an as needed basis. **SIDEWALK** – Salting or other snow chemicals may be used on the new concrete sidewalks. If you see salt, know it's safe to use and will not damage the newly laid concrete.

**STOVE** – not many people even knew the stove had issues. Four top burners (out of six) were so warped that pots could not make appropriate contact. One of the oven's thermostats was also not working properly. The thermostat has been replaced and all six top burners have been replaced thereby, extending the life of the oven. There were concerns about the griddle not working.....well, it is fine but it needs at least 20 – 30 minutes to heat up. This is a solid piece of metal so it takes additional time to heat up BUT holds heat for long periods of time.

It's a matter of patience and timing.

Last, the Property Committee is back up and meeting on a monthly basis. The intent is to gather ALL projects – whether the Monday Morning Crew is handling or Brian/Dan/Russ. It meets the second Tuesday of the month at 6:30. If you have something that the committee needs to address, please let Brian Wolf or Matt Hogen know. There are likely many, numerous little items that are not included here. The Monday Morning Crew does a fantastic job of taking on and completing the projects that need immediate attention. Prince of Peace is lucky to have such a group, and we thank them.
