Starting in September, Prince of Peace has been telling our story, hearing from a chronological selection of scripture readings each week. So far, the story has



focused on the promises made by God, and our readings have added texture to an over-arching narrative that God will always remain faithful to us. We lived deeply into the stories of the Old Testament as we celebrated creation, remembered deliverance from the flood, received the blessings of Sarah & Abraham, were carried out of bondage, re-formed into community, received counsel from judges, kings and prophets.

And in December, we visited God's promises as we faced changing realities, external threats, lost identities, and the occupation of what matters most by powers beyond our control. Perhaps you're like us and have felt like something has been missing throughout all of these Old Testament wanderings? Sixteen weeks this community has gathered, without nary a word from our beloved Gospels. These four months of listening for good news from the more ancient of sources have been a trial of sorts, a journey preparing us for something else all together.

This story, of course, is pointing us in a new direction, ultimately to a new day, ushered in on a starlit night, as angels sing and shepherds quake. This story, of course, is pointing us to Jesus, Immanuel. (Continued on page 4)

"Why Jesus?" is a worship and faith formation series designed in collaboration with a collection of churches and leaders using the Narrative Lectionary. Prince of Peace partnered in the development of this project and shared a number of resources that have been collected and made available for any participating congregation to utilize. It's anticipated that upwards of 50 congregations are making use of this series during Epiphany, 2019.

They volunteer at a different site every day of the week, and both sides are loving their new partnership with Prince of Peace. When they complete their work, one of the regular Friday morning bulletin volunteers serves them coffee or tea.

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Pastor Peter: Love's Pure Light Shines

Excerpts from Pastor Peter's Christmas Eve message...

Is there a holiday that holds more nostalgic power than Christmas? Part of the joys that I experience each year is the reminiscing of Christmases past. Perhaps this is true for you too? Allow me the chance to get nostalgic for a moment. I was lucky enough to live in Germany as a young child. I suppose because we were so far from home and family back here in the US, that my folks decided to make our own holiday fun. For Christmas each year, we would go skiing with other ex-patriot friends living in Europe. We tried out a few different destination ski-towns but ultimately fell in love with and returned many times to the tiny Austrian village of Sheffau, in the Tyrollean Alps just south of Germany, between Innsbruck and Salzburg. All my memories of these Christmas trips maintain a storybook-like quality. Lots of snow to ski on, rustic chalets decorated with real-pine garland, actual sleigh-rides behind giant draft horses, and of course midnight mass on Christmas Eve, packed into the village church, holding candles and singing, in German of course.

There is another Austrian village that sits just outside Salzburg, also in the Tyrollean mountain setting of my storybook Christmas memory. The church in Oberndorf is named after St. Nicholas, as if to cement its place in Christmas Eve history. On Christmas Eve in 1818, exactly 200 years ago on this night, the church organist, Franz Gruber, was confronted with an organ that wouldn't play. The young parish priest, Joseph Mohr, gave the organist a Christmas poem he had written. Gruber composed a tune on his guitar and the congregation sang together that night. Their voices joined in a song of angels and shepherds and a baby on a still and holy night.

This Christmas Iullaby was ultimately translated years later into English by an Episcopal priest named John Freeman Young, far from the Tyrollean mountains, in New York City. Mohr and Gruber's Austrian carol has been translated into 140 different languages and Bing Crosby's rendition is the 3rd most purchased recorded single of all time.

This beautiful lullaby has been sung on Christmas Eve for 200 years and has become one of the most beloved ways of telling this amazing story. The story of God's promise fulfilled, love's pure light has come into our darkened world. The glory streams from everywhere, and we add our own alleluia.

So let's tell this story and let's raise our voices on this holiest of nights and all the dark nights to come. Let's sing this song of promises fulfilled, of love come down and a God whose glory sends us back out to be the light that remains for the sake of the world. Amen.

God's promises are no longer an intellectual exercise but now something that can be seen and touched and heard. God's promised is God's very self, a child cradled in a



manger. And, as the story will soon reveal, a human manifestation of divine love, come to teach and heal and help us to discover things more important about ourselves than what holds us back.

One thing is certain: God has big things in mind for us. And to uncover the "where" and "what" and "when" of how this will play out, we first have to answer the question of "why;" and, in particular, "why Jesus?" During the season of Epiphany, this year the months of January and February, our lectionary is firmly planted in the opening half of the Gospel of Matthew.

Each week's featured text will add another piece of the story and another response to "why Jesus? Because Jesus is..."

This Epiphany, listen deeply once again, as we use the stories of the season and the Gospel of Matthew to help us move from promise to purpose and from problems to possibilities.

We hope you'll join us.

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From Pastor Betsy: Exploring the Gospel of Matthew

With the New Year, we are plunging into the Gospel of Matthew. Using the Narrative Lectionary, we'll hear the story of Jesus in chronological sequence from one voice beginning December 30 through the Sunday after Easter on April 28 when the text is Jesus' Great Commission to the disciples:



"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

-Matthew 28:17

This Gospel of Matthew connects us to the much bigger story of what God has done and is doing throughout time. We are part of something much bigger than ourselves. Speaking to Joseph in the first chapter, the angel reveals the central theme of the Gospel: Jesus is "Emmanuel, which means God is with us." (Matthew 1:23).

Matthew was a Jewish writer writing for an audience well versed in the Jewish faith. More than any other Gospel, Matthew makes connections to the Old Testament and many of the stories that we have heard this fall. He begins with the genealogy of Jesus, showing how this is rooted in the ancient stories of faith. Because yes, God is doing something new but it is building on the faith that we all share. Jesus is the fulfillment of prophesy. Jesus comes to "save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:21)

Matthew also helps us apply this ancient faith to our lives today. In his teaching Jesus is asked which is the greatest of the Commandments. Jesus says:

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind... And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."





Unique to the Gospel of Matthew is the story of the Wise Men, the family's flight to Egypt to avoid Herod's threat to kill Jesus, and the version of the Lord's Prayer that we pray every week. We also get Jesus' travels, relationship with the disciples, teaching in parables, and the Beatitudes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount. Matthew is thought to have been written between 80 and 100 AD. It appears that the author had the Gospel of Mark (written about 70 AD) and builds on this text and other oral tradition.

It's an exciting story to hear as it unfolds.

I encourage you to read the Gospel of Matthew – you may want to do it in one sitting to get an overall feel for Matthew. You may want to read along each week—we won't cover every verse of Matthew so you'll want to fill in the gaps so you don't miss anything! With God's Blessings, Pastor Betsy

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From Milt: "Why Jesus?" Questions

"Why Jesus" is an interesting question with many answers. "Why Jesus" is the theme for the nine Sundays in Epiphany. Each week "Why Jesus?" will be looked at from a statement such as "Because Jesus is blessing."

I think this could be a fascinating way to go through Epiphany. Another added bonus to all of this is that we are working on this series with other churches. Prince of Peace is responsible for one of the weeks, but all the other churches are responsible for coming up with ideas for the other weeks. This doesn't mean we have to use their ideas, and they don't have to use ours; but it does bring in many creative ideas from which to ponder. We will be walking with Jesus through the Gospel of Matthew during Epiphany, so reading the first five chapters of Matthew will get you ready for January. What stories do you think are the focus of "Why Jesus?" Do you have a favorite story in Matthew? If so, will it be used? These are the types of questions that arose as I was looking for hymns to use during Epiphany.

"Because Jesus is blessing" has one of my favorite passages in it: Matthew 5: 14-16. This is the scripture reading we use to give a newly baptized person their baptismal candle. This is the scripture reading of where we hear we are the God's light and because of that we need to let our light shine. Just a heads up: We will be using "This Little Light of Mine" somewhere in the service that day.

In looking at the texts, etc..... for Epiphany, I found it interesting to say "why me" and then look at the "Because" statement and say "Because I'm a blessing," or whatever the statement is. It is an interesting way to look at how your "Light" is shining in the world. It's been eye-opening for me, in that many times I don't have easy answers for how my life is like the "Because" statements. If I'm a part of God's light to the world I think I should be able to say "Because....." when I ask "Why Me?"

I hope you find the "Why Jesus?" series in Epiphany a valuable look at how you are living your faith. ELW 677 is "This Little Light of Mine" and the 3rd verse is

"Jesus gave it to me,
I'm goin'-a let it shine;
Jesus gave it to me,
I'm goin'-a let it shine;
Jesus gave it to me,
I'm goin'-a let it shine,
let it shine, let it shine, let it shine."

My prayer for all of us is that no matter how brightly God's light is shining in each of us, we all learn to have it shine even brighter. Matthew 5: 14-16 from Contemporary English Version:

"You are like light for the whole world.

A city built on top of a hill cannot be hidden, and no one would light a lamp and put it under a clay pot. A lamp is placed on a lamp stand where it can give light to everyone in the house. Make your light shine, so that others will see the good that you do and praise your Father in heaven."



Pastor Ruth: Letters for Your Legacy

I recently read a great article on MPR's website about writing "legacy letters" (MPRnews.org Dec 17, 2018). Legacy Letters, also known as ethical wills, are letters you write to share while you are still alive about your beliefs, your values, and how you would like to be remembered.

They are a powerful tool to help you have conversations about what gives your life meaning and gives you hope that you wish to pass on to your loved ones. It is also a beautiful gift that you can leave behind after you die.

The MPR article listed some examples of the questions to reflect on such as

- How do you want to be remembered?
- What's something you've learned from your parents?
- What challenges have you overcome?

I love these reflection questions and have a few of my own to add for reflection:

- What is your image of God and how has that shaped your faith?
- Talk about a Scripture that has been important to you and why.
- What about your faith gives you hope and joy?
- Where have you seen the Holy Spirit at work in your life?

Another gift we can leave our loved ones is the gift of doing some pre-planning work around death and dying.

- Do you have a favorite hymn that you really want sung at your funeral or memorial service?
- How would you like your faith to be reflected through Scripture?
- Do you have an estate plan? Do you have a living will or durable power of attorney?
- Do you have charitable organizations that you would to donate to through your estate or memorials?
- Have you talked to any family members about your wishes? Would they know what you would like?

These are important conversations that matter, and sometimes we just need a little help to start the conversation. I am happy to meet with you to reflect and think through your own wishes, whether you want to plan your service, think through your end of life decisions, or how you communicate with loved ones.

We have a Prince of Peace planning guide to help get the conversation started. If you have specific plans about your funeral or memorial service we can keep a copy of those wishes here at church.
