Pastor Ruth: Welcome to Advent! In November, we had the delight of hosting Rollie Martinson for our "Elders Rising" event. He talked about pioneering a new epoch in aging, how to use your spiritual gifts as you age, and how much the world needs elders who share their stories, their faith, and their gifts of encouragement. He told a story that has been working on my heart as we enter the season of Advent and this year's theme of "Prepare to be amazed."

Rollie's story was about a group of elders whose gifts are in the realm of financial planning and stewardship. He said that this group has gotten together to encourage giving to their church

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and the ministry it is currently doing. But they are also using their energy to encourage others to leave gifts to the church in their wills so that they can make an impact on the church's ministry, in whatever form that takes, after they have passed away. Amazing! This money is meant to be spent on a church that might look radically different than the church these elders have known. This money might fund ministry that was never even dreamed of while these elders were church members. This money might fund ways of unfolding the Gospel to people that we never thought possible. All this with no strings attached. Amazing! I can just about guarantee that if these givers could see into the future and how their gifts will be used they would be absolutely amazed. What I found inspiring was the trust in God and the leaders of the future that God will raise up so completely so that they could say YES to giving to the future church.



We don't know what the church will look like in 50 years. We don't know what it will look like in 10! But we do know that God keeps calling the body of Christ to be good news in a world where people are hungry for welcome, justice, mercy, love, and relationships. We do know that God shows up in surprising ways to get to us with love, like being born in a barn to a poor, teenage girl. We do know that God works through the unexpected to keep our hearts and minds open and nimble enough to see the outrageous possibilities that exist when God's Holy Spirit is loose in the world. Amazing! Maybe this should be our Advent call. Be open to saying YES to what God calls us to even when we aren't exactly sure what it's going to look like. What can you say YES to this season? Maybe it is around issues of giving, or inviting a friend to worship, or getting to know someone else at church. Maybe God is calling you to explore the scriptures more deeply, or start a spiritual practice, or pray for that person who drives you nuts. Maybe God is calling you to say yes to entering into the work of advocating for someone who doesn't look like you, worship

like you, or talk like you. Maybe God is calling you to trust that God takes all of who we are, our whole lives, and uses us to heal and enliven our world. You just never know.

In the Twin Cities, LSS offers several transitional living options for youth ages 16 to 24 who are ready to establish and maintain an independent household. Many of them have young children. Items may be brought to church through December 29.



A Season of Generosity

As we move from the Thanksgiving season into Advent and Christmas we feel gratitude for all the joys and rewards we experience in life. We are grateful for the season's opportunities to get together with friends and family and be happy, enjoying the good company.

Our church community provides us with several opportunities each year for us to share these gifts of community and fellowship with people outside our own walls. This year, the Social Concerns committee is lifting two organizations to our attention for support through our Thanksgiving and Christmas special worship services offerings and with our Christmas Gift Tree: Arrive Ministries and Lyngblomsten Care Center and Residences.



Arrive Ministries is a social services agency that works Serving Refugee & Immigrant Neighbors Together with faith communities in

"Carrying out God's command to welcome and bring lifelong transformation to refugees and immigrants in Minnesota ". Through Arrive Ministries over 500 volunteers have helped resettle 11,000 newly arriving people to our state.



Lyngblomsten Care Center and Residences is very familiar to our congregation through decades of support and shared activities. Our

close supportive relationship expresses our commitment to respect and enhance the lives of the elders of our community and their families.

Because individual members of refugee families and each of our seniors at Lyngblomsten have widely different needs we ask that instead of the more traditional "mittens" you attach gift cards in your choice of amount to the tree which will be in our narthex throughout the season.



Listen. Learn. Love: Serving our Neighbors Listen. Learn. Love. Is our theme for this year. One way to do this is by serving our neighbors out in the community. This year we are trying to have at least one service project each month for people of all ages. Times and locations vary to try to appeal to a broad audience.

Where We Have Served

- Bundles of Love in September. The projects included sorting baby clothes and cutting out baby sleepers.
- Feed My Starving Children in October. Packing meals to feed children around the world.
- Sheridan's Story Food Packing in November. The warehouse where bags of food are packaged is in Roseville. These are then boxed up and sent to 700 schools in the metro area. One of them is Central Park Elementary that we partner with.



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Want to Get Involved?

- Plymouth Christian Youth Center holds a gift sale on Sat., Dec. 14 in which children can shop for gifts for their families. Volunteer spots are available to set up for the sale or to help a child shop during the sale. If you wish to volunteer, contact Anne Haugan.
- Second Harvest January 20 On Martin Luther King Day, Second Harvest in Brooklyn Park hosts service opportunities for children and adults. Watch for sign ups coming soon!

Available During the Day?

If you are available on Friday mornings, we'd love to have you participate with distributing food to student backpacks at Central Park Elementary. This food goes home with low income students on the weekend, so they don't have a "food gap." Sign up at our website. Prince of Peace also started a food shelf at Roseville Area Middle School. Jennifer Duncan stocks this food shelf. Last year volunteers served at RAMS on Friday afternoons. This year the school has changed the process and it is administered by school staff.



From Betsy: Record Level of Homelessness in MN

In a recent sermon I shared that there are now 350 students in the Roseville Area School District who are homeless or unstably housed. This is up from 175 at the same time last year. That number is astonishing! The district has several very passionate people working with these families, but the problem is growing. Roseville does not have a homeless shelter and there is not enough low-income housing. Recently Keystone Community Food Shelf lost its location in Roseville, so there is no longer a food shelf in the community. Anne Haugan and I participate in a group that meets monthly called CAN (Community Action Network) with others from the community to address issues of homelessness. The group was initially called Homework Starts with Home, named for a grant from the state of Minnesota to provide stable housing for students and their families in four suburban Ramsey County School Districts including Roseville. About 15 families have found permanent housing so far through this grant.

According to the Wilder Foundation, homelessness in Minnesota is at an all-time record high. Over 10,000 Minnesotans are homeless (Star Tribune: "Minneapolis nonprofit lands \$5 million from Amazon's Jeff Bezos to help homeless families" Nov. 22).

Churches Can Make an Impact

Edina Community Lutheran Church saw a growing number of homeless youths in their community and decided to do something to make a difference. The congregation partnered with Beacon Interfaith Housing Cooperative to build a 39-unit building with studio apartments for previously homeless youth. Pastor Ruth and I recently met Deacon Lauren Morse-Wendt from Edina Community Lutheran who coordinated the project. She shared that the congregation contributed \$80,000 and then got a grant from the state for \$10 to build the project.

What Might We Do?

• Pray.

• Advocate for funding. Governor Tim Walz recently announced new funding to build affordable housing. Rep. Ilhan Omar introduced a bill to spend \$1 trillion for affordable housing over the next ten years with the goal of creating 12 million new housing units.

• Use our resources: Prince of Peace has people, passion, potential partnerships, land and monetary resources. How might we use these resources to make a difference?



Greetings from the Generosity Committee

This committee has been busy since our last update in April so it's time to share some news. This update includes a refresher on the committee's charge, a description of our work since April and concludes with our plans for next steps and a prayer request.

Refresher

The Generosity Committee was created by the Congregation Council in December 2018 to shepherd Prince of Peace as our congregation discerns how to best use the bequest of longtime Prince of Peace member Rose Diestler, who joined the church triumphant in April 2018. Rose bequeathed to the congregation her home, all of its contents, her automobile and approximately \$500,000 in investments. The committee members are Pastor Peter, Barry Brahier (chair), Andrea Clepper, Kent Olson, Diane Syverson and Linda Wagner.

The committee was charged by the Council with three tasks: Secure Rose's home, car and possessions until a plan was in place for them, recommend what that plan would be, and provide a plan for how the funds in Rose's bequest be best used. In March the Council accepted the committee's plan for the sale/distribution/disposal of all of Rose's possessions, the sale of the home, and the sale of the car. The Council also charged the committee with carrying out the plan.



Work Since April The committee carried out the plan over the summer. Those who have handled similar tasks for a loved one know this is a big job. Special

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acknowledgement is due to Andrea Clepper and Tammy Jackson. They were the engine behind the estate sale which took place in early June. With Andrea's and Tammy's drive and hard work, assisted by hours of labor provided by our youth and their parents, members of Ruth Circle, and a long list of others, over \$5,000 was generated for youth activities at Prince of Peace. You know you're running a terrific estate sale when random people stop by, shop, and then ask for the name of the professional firm who put the sale together!



Following the estate sale, a silent auction of paintings by Rose was held at the church and remaining items were donated to various causes. This included a day when

Prince of Peace members could stop by, pick up anything in the home and distribute it themselves. Our goal was to keep as many of Rose's possessions in use as possible and, thanks to all of you who participated, that goal was accomplished.

Final clean-out of the home and preparation for its sale followed. With the help of the members of the Ruth Circle, this task was completed with the care and respect Rose deserved. After a vote by the congregation authorizing the sale of the home, it was professionally cleaned, placed on the market and the sale closed in late August. We are all thankful for the assistance of congregation member Kim Wetteland, a real estate professional with Edina Realty. Kim did not take her commission on the sale so more of the value came to the church. Kim, along with Congregation Treasurer Chris Thornton, carried out the real estate transaction.

Surprisingly, the car has proved to be a bit more complicated to sell. The committee's original plan was to have this completed by early June, but the title and lien release were never found among Rose's papers. Pastor Peter took on having new documents issued by the state DMV listing the church as the owner. That task is completed and the car has been sold.

Next Steps

With all other parts of the committee's charge complete, we are turning our attention to the opportunity ahead: How should our congregation make best use of Rose's bequest which now totals approximately \$750,000?

The committee is now engaged in a Godcentered discernment process. We are meeting every other week through the end of 2019. At our last meeting in mid-October, it was the sense of the committee that while the path ahead is not yet clear, God has equipped all of us at Prince of Peace to take full advantage of this rare and awesome responsibility. In the coming weeks the committee will be communicating about ways you can contribute to the discernment of the path ahead as we develop the proposal we trust will emerge.

Prayer Request

While the committee will provide a proposal and the Council will exercise due diligence regarding that proposal, the decision on how best to use the single largest gift our congregation has ever received from one of its members will be by a vote of our congregation. All of us on the Generosity Committee request all members of Prince of Peace pray for discernment and guidance for yourself so that you may be prepared for the choices ahead.

Worship Musings from Milt

I always look forward to Advent/Christmas Season and I usually start listening to Christmas music around Halloween. There are things that I don't look forward to during the Advent/ Christmas season too: large crowds at stores, people going so fast they don't take time to enjoy anything, the importance of how much one gives and gets, etc. But even these things can be turned to an "adventure" instead of a "chore" with the proper attitude.

I think my biggest frustration with Christmas is that by the time Christmas comes on the church calendar most people are over Christmas, which makes Advent a hard season to plan for. How does one wait on the coming of Jesus when Christmas abounds everywhere? How do I use the glorious Advent hymns and not give people a glimpse of Christmas? This year, the first Sunday of Advent is on Thanksgiving weekend. So many people will be celebrating Thanksgiving all weekend with their families; will anyone really be tuned in to Advent? Hopefully the church decorations will help usher in the new season, but with lights, wreaths, nativities and all the rest, it still may seem more like Christmas.

The third Sunday in Advent features the Sunday School Christmas program, so there will be a glimpse of Advent, but a lot of Christmas. The same can be said for the fourth Sunday in Advent, which is a Service of Lessons and Carols, a bit of Advent, but also lot of Christmas. So with everything going on the second Sunday in Advent is the one Sunday that Advent can have everybody's attention, but I'm guessing that most people will want to hear something "Christmassy."

I believe it is important to take time to anticipate the birth of Jesus, in order to have Christmas be the celebration it should be. Each Sunday in Advent, I try to make sure the Advent text is enhanced by the hymns, but still give people something that reminds them of Christmas. After all, if we attend worship, we should know the Christmas story. How do you explain the Christmas story to someone that is a different religion, hasn't been brought up in the church, or just wants Christmas to be about Santa Claus? Can this be done without telling someone about Gabriel coming to Zechariah, Elizabeth and Mary? Wouldn't it help to tell someone about Isaiah saying there will be a voice in the wilderness preparing the way for Jesus, for them to understand the meaning of Christmas.

In "A Charlie Brown Christmas," Linus reads



from the Gospel of Luke as the meaning of Christmas. My prayer is that we all take time to make ourselves ready for Linus to read from Luke. My additional prayer is that we show the Love of God all year

thru. Maybe if we could all Live Christmas, the world would be more willing to see Christmas from the voice of Linus reading Luke and not just a time of year to give presents. I'm sure I've used the words from my song "Living Christmas Card', but living your life showing God's love is, for me, what being a Christian is all about.

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Confirmation Reimagined



PoP's 7th and 8th grade confirmation students spent a recent Friday serving at Second Harvest and preparing for PoP's Tanzania Dinner. It was a Confirmation mini retreat on a no school day in Roseville. The kids are studying the Lord's Prayer, focusing on "give us today our daily bread."

This is the second year of a new confirmation model where students meet once a month - either on a Sunday from 4-8 pm or on a day off from school. These longer sessions allow us to go into greater depth and include service-learning activities to help students understand



what we are studying and how it applies to daily life.

This year we are studying the Catechism. September and October focused on the Ten Commandments. The students had a project of coming up with creative ways to teach the Ten Commandments to kids because when you teach something, you actually learn a lot. They presented a puppet show and a game show on the Ten Commandments at worship on the Fall Retreat at Camp Wapo.



At Second Harvest in November, the project was sorting 2,000-pound bags of potatoes, discarding the rotting ones and placing the good potatoes into 40lb bags. Second Harvest is the food supplier for food shelves and soup kitchens in 57 counties in MN and WI. It was hard work and the students got dirty, but it was rewarding to see the results. Students from Prince of Peace were also winners in the funniest shaped potato contest with potatoes shaped like a mustache, two hearts becoming one, and a submarine.



Debriefing the experience afterward, Youth Director Cori Forcey asked the students about other organizations they are aware of that help to feed people in the community. We also read the story about Elijah and the Widow of Zaraphath. When asked why we are reading this, one student responded, "It's about food insecurity." At the end of the day, another student said, "I'm glad we did this - otherwise I would have stayed home and done nothing today."





Confirmation meets next on Sunday, Dec. 8 from 4-8. The focus will be on "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us."
